Call for Papers



The Journal of Far Right Studies (ZRex – Zeitschrift für Rechtsextremismusforschung) is calling for full papers on the topic of the far right and related issues from all disciplines. Empirical, methodological, theoretical as well as practice-related contributions are welcome.

Full papers are being accepted on a rolling basis and can be handed in at all times. For contributions that will appear in issue 11 (publication planned for March 2026), we ask for submission by July 30, 2025.

ZRex is open to papers from overlapping and adjacent fields of research (e.g. research on anti-Semitism, racism, Nazism or social cohesion), as long as a connection to the far right is given.

The regional focus of the journal is on Europe and the US, but ZRex is open to examples from other regions of the world. Contributions in both German and English are welcome. The articles are generally written in German, but submissions in English are expressly encouraged. Each article contains a summary and keywords in German and English that precede the main text.

The journal only publishes original papers. By submitting their manuscript, authors declare that their contribution has not already been published or submitted elsewhere. All papers will go through a double-blind peer review process. Hence, please avoid the author's name, conspicuous self-citations, project names etc. that might indicate authorship.

Length of contribution: 30,000 to max. 50,000 characters including spaces, footnotes, bibliography and additional information. For further information, please consult our <u>manuscript instructions</u>.

Possible topics for contributions can be:

- European concepts of the far right
- the far right in the European Parliament
- the internationalisation of the far right
- foreign policy concepts of the far right
- Colonialism and the far right
- competition and cooperation between far-right parties at European level and between far-right and centre-right parties, e.g. in the European Parliament
- current developments, e.g. on the far right and the Russian war against the Ukraine
- historical and current analyses of the development of far right organisations, parties and movements
- the far right in parliaments and governments
- history of ideas, production of ideology and discourse strategies of the far right
- individual, collective and societal far-right radicalisation
- far-right violence, far-right terrorism and hate crime
- anti-Semitism and racism
- gender and the far right
- digitalisation of the far right
- interactions between the far right and religious fundamentalism
- international developments and comparisons; local and country comparisons
- practical reflections and evaluations of countermeasures
- literature reviews
