Manuscript Preparation Guide

- 1. Please, hand in an anonymous version of your manuscript. Pay attention to
 - a. disable the notification of the author's name(s) in your text programme;
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- 6. The contribution starts with an abstract in English and German, which summarizes the most important results.
- 7. Please add five Keywords in English and German.
- 8. Subdivide the contribution **into several sections and/or several chapters** and provide these sections in each case with a short subheading. Subdivisions should occur on **max. two stages** (for example 2.1, 2.2, 2.3).
- 9. Simple **references to literature** (if required, also two to three proofs) should in the text normally occur at the end of a sentence unit. For example: (vgl. Glaser 1985a, P. 12; Meyer 1975, P. 14). The same is valid for direct quoting, for example: "......" (Simmel 1920, P. 12).
- 10. Notes and footnotes should be inserted at the end of the part and should be numbered Arabian consecutively.

- 11. The **bibliography** should contain **all literature cited in the text**. Any references are to start on a new line. Examples of references:
 - a. Monographs:

Giddens, A. (1986): The Constitution of Society: Outline of the Theory of Structuration Berkeley.

b. Several Authors:

Strauss, A.L./Corbin, J.M. (1990): Basics of qualitative research: Grounded theory procedures and techniques. Newbury Park, Calif.

c. Work by Editor(s):

Hoy, D.C. (Ed.) (1999): Foucault. A critical reader. Oxford.

d. Part of an edited book:

Davidson, A.I. (1999): Archaeology, Genelogy, Ethics. In: Hoy, D.C. (Ed.): Foucault. A critical reader. Oxford, P. 221–233.

e. Journal articles:

Willoughby, K.W. (2004): Technological semantics and technological practice: Lessons from an enigmatic episode in twentieth-century technology studies. In: Knowledge, Technology & Policy, Vol. 17, N. 3–4. S. 11–43.

f. Several places of publication:

Charmaz, K. (2006): Constructing Grounded Theory: A Practical Guide through Qualitative Analysis. London/Thousand Oaks/New Dehli.

g. Online articles:

Walker, J.R. (1998): Basic CGOS Style. http://www.columbia.edu/cu/cup/cgos/basic.html (May 11, 2001)

h. News or magazine articles:

Name, first name (Year): Title. In: Magazine, Date, Pages. URL (accessed)

- 12. Pay attention during the preparation of the bibliography that:
 - a. the (shortened) first names are not missing (also at editors of an anthology)
 - b. name suffixes are written to the first name

e.g.: Hella von Unger (2013) = Unger, H.v. (2013)

- c. the page numbers in magazine themes and parts from anthologies are complete (not P. 54ff.), but (P. 54–62)
- d. several contributions of an author in the same year in the text and the bibliography are separated with (a) and (b), etc.
- e. in the case of journals age-groups and notebook numbers, are separated clearly, for example: Sociological Revue, Vol. 38, H. 6, P. 1–20
- f. no names of publishers are mentioned, however all places of publishers are mentioned in the bibliography
- g. all names (in the text or in the bibliography) appear in standard font (not italic or capital letters)
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- 16. Acronyms consisting of several words should be written without spaces (e.g.: Frankfurt, a.M.)
- 17. Tables and charts should be transmitted separately. Please highlight the place the chart should be inset in the paper.

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- 19. The contribution should be written in a gender-neutral language.

Please consider the above points as possible at writing the text. You save yourself and us a lot of unnecessary corrective work and correspondence. Thank you!
